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WASHINGTON -- SECRETARY OF STATE HAIG ARRIVED IN LONDON APRIL 8 ON THE FIRST LEG OF A MISSION TO ASSIST BRITAIN AND ARGENTINA IN THE SEARCH FOR A PEACEFUL SOLUTION TO THEIR DISPUTE OVER THE FALKLAND ISLANDS.

STATE DEPARTMENT DEPUTY SPOKESMAN ALAN ROMBERG SAID HAIG HAS ALREADY CONFERRED WITH PRIME MINISTER MARGARET THATCHER AND OTHER BRITISH OFFICIALS.

ROMBERG SAID HE DID NOT HAVE "A PRECISE TIMETABLE" FOR HAIG'S ONWARD TRAVEL TO BUENOS AIRES OR HIS RETURN TO WASHINGTON.

THE DEPUTY SPOKESMAN DECLINED TO COMMENT ON THE BRITISH DECLARATION OF A 200-MILES (320 KILOMETER) WAR ZONE AROUND THE FALKLANDS, BUT SAID THE UNITED STATES HAD BEEN "OFFICIALLY INFORMED" OF THE BRITISH DECISION.

ROMBERG SAID IT WOULD BE INAPPROPRIATE FOR HIM TO COMMENT ON ANY SPECIFIC ASPECTS OF THE FALKLANDS DISPUTE.

ASKED ABOUT BRITISH STATEMENTS THAT THERE COULD BE NO NEGOTIATIONS UNTIL ARGENTINE FORCES HAVE BEEN WITHDRAWN FROM THE FALKLANDS, ROMBERG REPLIED:

"I DO NOT THINK IT WOULD SERVE ANY USEFUL PURPOSE FOR ME TO COMMENT ON THAT KIND OF QUESTION WHILE SECRETARY HAIG IS ENGAGED IN HIS CURRENT MISSION."

ROMBERG SAID THAT "ANY NEXT STEPS REGARDING ANY ASPECT OF THE ADMINISTRATION, FROM THE PRESIDENT ON DOWN, WILL BE DETERMINED IN LARGE MEASURE BY WHAT HAPPENS DURING THE COURSE OF THESE PRELIMINARY DISCUSSIONS."

IN RESPONSE TO A SPECIFIC QUESTION, ROMBERG SAID HE HAD NO INFORMATION TO SUGGEST THAT PRESIDENT REAGAN MAY BECOME PERSONALLY INVOLVED IN THE EFFORT TO ASSIST THE TWO COUNTRIES IN REACHING A PEACEFUL RESOLUTION OF THEIR DISPUTE. HE NOTED THAT THE PRESIDENT HAD TELEPHONED ARGENTINA PRESIDENT LEOPOLDO GALTIERI OF ARGENTINA LAST WEEK.

ROMBERG ALSO WAS ASKED WHAT PROVISIONS THE NORTH ATLANTIC TREATY ORGANIZATION (NATO) WAS MAKING FOR THE WITHDRAWAL OF

BRITISH NAVAL UNITS FROM THE NORTH ATLANTIC.

"IN ACCORDANCE WITH NATO PROCEDURES, ANY CHANGES IN READINESS AND AVAILABILITY OF ALLIED FORCES ARE NOTIFIED AS NECESSARY TO THE MAJOR NATO COMMANDERS THROUGH NORMAL MILITARY CHANNELS," ROMBERG SAID. "ANY READJUSTMENTS IN NATO FORCES WHICH MIGHT BE REQUIRED AS A RESULT OF THOSE CHANGES WOULD BE THE SUBJECT OF CONSULTATIONS WITHIN NATO."

HE SAID HE HAD NO SPECIFIC INFORMATION AS TO WHETHER SUCH CONSULTATIONS HAD ALREADY BEGUN.

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AS FOR THE TREATY OF RIO, HE SAID, "THERE'S NO SUGGESTION AT THIS POINT OF THAT TREATY COMING INTO EFFECT. WE HAVE TO BEAR IN MIND THAT, AS THE UNITED NATIONS POINTED OUT IN THEIR RESOLUTION CONDEMNING ARGENTINA, FORCE WAS USED TO TAKE THE FALKLAND ISLANDS."

ON OTHER SUBJECTS, WEINBERGER SAID THAT PRESIDENT REAGAN "MAY WANT TO TALK" TO SOVIET PRESIDENT BREZHNEV AT THE UNITED NATIONS IN JUNE IN GENERAL TERMS ABOUT THE U.S. NEGOTIATING POSITION ON STRATEGIC ARMS REDUCTION TALKS "WITHOUT GOING INTO THE SPECIFICS OF THE NEGOTIATING POSITION" WHICH IS NOW BEING DEVELOPED.

A NUCLEAR FREEZE "WOULD BE A VERY DANGEROUS THING" FOR THE UNITED STATES NOW, WEINBERGER SAID, BECAUSE OF THE SOVIET MILITARY BUILDUP OF THE PAST 21 YEARS.

BUT "THIS ISN'T TO SAY THAT WE CAN'T WORK OUT SOME KIND OF GENERAL REDUCTION OF STRATEGIC NUCLEAR WEAPONS JUST AS THE PRESIDENT PROPOSED FOR INTERMEDIATE-RANGE WEAPONS," WEINBERGER SAID.

WHAT THE FREEZE PROPONENTS ARE TALKING ABOUT, WEINBERGER NOTED, IS "LETTING THE SOVIETS STAY WHERE THEY ARE AND CONTINUE THE MOMENTUM THAT THEY HAVE..."

THE DEFENSE SECRETARY SAID, "NOW WE CAN START NEGOTIATIONS, AND IF THE SOVIETS ARE WILLING TO DO SO, WE CAN MAKE SUBSTANTIAL REDUCTIONS ON BOTH SIDES THAT CAN PRODUCE (A) STRATEGIC DETERRENT BALANCE AT FAR LOWER LEVELS" THAN AT PRESENT.

"BUT TO FREEZE NOW," HE ADDED, "WOULD FREEZE INTO THE EXISTING SITUATION THE MOMENTUM AND THE DEGREE OF ADVANTAGE THAT THE SOVIETS HAVE MANAGED TO BUILD UP OVER THE YEARS."

HAIG TO ASSIST IN BRITAIN, ARGENTINA DISPUTE

WASHINGTON -- PRESIDENT REAGAN DISPATCHED SECRETARY OF STATE HAIG TO BRITAIN AND ARGENTINA APRIL 7 TO ASSIST IN THE SEARCH FOR A PEACEFUL SOLUTION TO THEIR DISPUTE OVER THE FALKLAND ISLANDS.

HAIG'S MISSION WAS ANNOUNCED BY THE WHITE HOUSE FOLLOWING A NATIONAL SECURITY COUNCIL REVIEW OF THE SITUATION IN THE SOUTH ATLANTIC.

IT CAME LESS THAN TWO HOURS BEFORE THE PRESIDENT LEFT WASHINGTON ON A FIVE-DAY TRIP TO JAMAICA AND BARBADOS. HAIG HAD BEEN SCHEDULED TO ACCOMPANY THE PRESIDENT. DEPUTY SECRETARY OF STATE WALTER STOESEL WENT IN HAIG'S PLACE.

THE WHITE HOUSE STATEMENT SAID "IN KEEPING WITH THE INITIATIVES THE PRESIDENT HAS TAKEN WITH BOTH PRIME MINISTER (MARGARET) THATCHER AND PRESIDENT (LEOPOLDO) GALTIERI AND HIS OFFER OF ASSISTANCE, THE PRESIDENT HAS DIRECTED SECRETARY OF STATE HAIG TO CONTINUE CONSULTATIONS WITH THE GOVERNMENTS OF THE UNITED KINGDOM AND ARGENTINA IN THE INTEREST OF ASSISTING BOTH PARTIES IN THE SEARCH FOR A PEACEFUL RESOLUTION ON THE DISPUTE IN THE SOUTH ATLANTIC."

"THE PRESIDENT DIRECTED SECRETARY HAIG TO PROCEED TO LONDON AND BUENOS AIRES AT THE INVITATION OF BOTH GOVERNMENTS," THE STATEMENT SAID.

WHITE HOUSE COMMUNICATIONS DIRECTOR DAVID GERGEN CAUTIONED REPORTERS AGAINST CHARACTERIZING HAIG'S ROLE AS THAT OF A "MEDIATOR."

"THIS IS AN EFFORT TO BE OF ASSISTANCE," GERGEN SAID.

A RARE SPRING BLIZZARD HAS BLASTED THE EAST COAST OF THE UNITED STATES, DUMPING UP TO 16 INCHES OF SNOW FROM MASSACHUSETTS TO MARYLAND.

HEAVY SNOWS, HIGH WINDS AND RECORD LOW TEMPERATURES PARALYZED DOZENS OF CITIES APRIL 6. MAJOR AIRPORTS WERE CLOSED AND WORKERS AND STUDENTS WERE SENT HOME EARLY AND WARNED NOT TO VENTURE OUTSIDE INTO WHAT WEATHER OFFICIALS CALLED A "LIFE-THREATENING" BLIZZARD.

IN NEW YORK CITY, PUBLIC SCHOOLS WERE CLOSED APRIL 7 BECAUSE OF BAD WEATHER FOR THE FIRST TIME IN FOUR YEARS AND MASS TRANSIT WAS STALLED.

NO U.S. TREATY COMMITMENT SEEN IN FALKLANDS

WASHINGTON -- DEFENSE SECRETARY WEINBERGER SAYS THERE IS "NO SUGGESTION AT THIS POINT" THAT TREATY AGREEMENTS WITH ARGENTINA AND BRITAIN WOULD COMMIT THE UNITED STATES TO EITHER SIDE IN THE DISPUTE OVER THE FALKLAND ISLANDS.

SPEAKING ON NBC-TV'S "TODAY SHOW" NEWS INTERVIEW PROGRAM APRIL 7, WEINBERGER ACKNOWLEDGED THAT A 1962 TREATY WITH BRITAIN COMMITS THE UNITED STATES TO MAKE AVAILABLE TO THE BRITISH AN AIRFIELD ON ASCENSION ISLAND, AND THE TREATY OF RIO DE JANEIRO COMMITS WESTERN HEMISPHERE NATIONS TO AID EACH OTHER IN CASE OF ATTACK.

BUT WEINBERGER SAID OF THE 1962 TREATY WITH BRITAIN THAT ALTHOUGH THE UNITED STATES HAS HAD USE OF THE AIRFIELD IN THE ATLANTIC AND WOULD BE COMMITTED TO ALLOWING THE BRITISH TO USE IT IN AN EMERGENCY, "I DON'T SEE ANY CONFLICTS OR ANY PROBLEMS ABOUT THAT AT THIS TIME."

THE SITUATION IS DELICATE."
 THE SECRETARY CONFERRED SEPARATELY APRIL 6 WITH SIR
 NICHOLAS HENDERSON, THE BRITISH AMBASSADOR TO THE UNITED
 STATES, AND WITH ESTEBAN TAKACS, THE ARGENTINE AMBASSADOR TO
 THE UNITED STATES. HAIG ALSO MET WITH ARGENTINE FOREIGN
 MINISTER NICANOR COSTA MENDEZ.

THE STATE DEPARTMENT PRESS OFFICE SAID THE MEETINGS WERE
 PART OF THE PRESIDENT'S OFFER OF AMERICAN "GOOD OFFICES" IN

 FOLLOWING HIS MEETING WITH HAIG, FOREIGN MINISTER COSTA

AT THE REGULAR STATE DEPARTMENT NEWS BRIEFING, DEPUTY
 SPOKESMAN ALAN ROMBERG SAID HAIG'S TALKS IN LONDON AND
 BUENOS AIRES WOULD BE OF A "PRELIMINARY" NATURE. THE
 SECRETARY WAS TO BE ACCOMPANIED BY SEVERAL STATE DEPARTMENT
 OFFICIALS, INCLUDING ASSISTANT SECRETARY FOR INTER-AMERICAN
 AFFAIRS THOMAS ENDERS AND AT LEAST ONE SENIOR NATIONAL
 SECURITY COUNCIL STAFF MEMBER, ROMBERG SAID.

HE SAID HAIG WOULD BE IN LONDON APRIL 8 AND WOULD THEN
 TRAVEL TO BUENOS AIRES BEFORE RETURNING TO WASHINGTON.
 ROMBERG SAID THE SECRETARY'S SCHEDULE WAS STILL TENTATIVE
 AND IT WAS NOT CERTAIN WHICH BRITISH AND ARGENTINE OFFICIALS
 HAIG WILL MEET.

ROMBERG SAID IT WAS EXPECTED THAT THE SECRETARY'S TALKS
 WOULD BE "AT MINISTERIAL LEVEL."

HE EMPHASIZED THAT THE UNITED STATES WANTS TO BE HELPFUL
 IN RESOLVING THE DISPUTE BETWEEN BRITAIN AND ARGENTINA, BOTH
 OF WHICH ARE CONSIDERED FRIENDLY GOVERNMENTS. BUT ROMBERG
 SAID THE STATE DEPARTMENT ALSO STANDS BEHIND ITS STATEMENT
 OF APRIL 2 DEPLORING THE ARGENTINE INVASION OF THE FALKLAND
 ISLANDS, WHICH HAD BEEN UNDER BRITISH ADMINISTRATION FOR THE
 PAST 150 YEARS, AND CALLING FOR A WITHDRAWAL OF ARGENTINE
 ARMED FORCES.

ROMBERG SAID THE UNITED STATES WAS AWARE OF THE PLANNED
 INVASION BEFORE IT TOOK PLACE AND THAT THE UNITED STATES HAD
 BEEN "IN TOUCH WITH BRITAIN WITHIN THAT TIMEFRAME."
 HOWEVER, HE DID NOT PROVIDE ANY DETAILS.

ABOUT 35 AMERICAN CITIZENS ARE BELIEVED TO BE ON THE
 FALKLAND ISLANDS, ROMBERG SAID, AND ACCORDING TO LATEST
 INFORMATION, NONE HAS BEEN HARMED. "WE HAVE NO REPORTS OF
 HARM TO ANY CIVILIANS," ROMBERG SAID.

THE DEPUTY SPOKESMAN DECLINED TO ATTACH "ANY PARTICULAR
 TIMEFRAME" TO THE AMERICAN EFFORT TO ASSIST IN THE SEARCH
 FOR A SOLUTION TO THE DISPUTE. HE ACKNOWLEDGED THAT HAIG'S

"WE ARE CONCERNED THAT THERE IS A POTENTIALLY RATHER

U.S. PLANS NO NEW ARMS SALES TO TAIWAN --

ROMBERG SAID THE UNITED STATES CONTEMPLATES NO NEW WEAPONS SALES TO TAIWAN FOR THE NEXT FEW MONTHS WHILE U.S.-CHINA BILATERAL TALKS CONTINUE.

HE WAS COMMENTING ON A WALL STREET JOURNAL REPORT APRIL 7 WHICH SAID CHINA WILL NOT DOWNGRADE ITS POLITICAL RELATIONS WITH THE UNITED STATES TO PROTEST A U.S. TRANSFER OF SPARE PARTS TO TAIWAN.

ROMBERG SAID THE UNITED STATES TOLD CHINA THREE THINGS LAST DECEMBER:

- THE TRANSFER INVOLVES NO WEAPONS;
- IT IS PART OF A LONG-STANDING ARRANGEMENT MADE BEFORE PRESIDENT REAGAN MET CHINESE PREMIER ZHAO ZIYANG IN CANCUN, MEXICO, EARLIER THIS YEAR;
- THE UNITED STATES CONTEMPLATES NO NEW DECISION IN THE NEXT FEW MONTHS WHILE TALKS WITH BEIJING GO ON.

IMMIGRANT VISA FEES INCREASED --

THE STATE DEPARTMENT HAS ANNOUNCED AN INCREASE IN IMMIGRANT VISA FEES TO 100 DOLLARS, SINCE THE PREVIOUS 25 DOLLAR FEE NO LONGER COVERS THE COST OF ISSUING EACH IMMIGRANT VISA.

THE INCREASE, WHICH BECAME EFFECTIVE APRIL 1, WAS THE FIRST IN 30 YEARS. A PRESS STATEMENT ISSUED BY THE STATE DEPARTMENT SAID THE NEW FEES, WHICH WILL BE DEPOSITED IN THE GENERAL REVENUES OF THE U.S. TREASURY, ARE EXPECTED TO INCREASE RECEIPTS TO THE GOVERNMENT BY 35 MILLION DOLLARS A YEAR.

THE NEW FEE DOES NOT APPLY TO NONIMMIGRANT VISAS, SUCH AS THOSE ISSUED FOR TOURISTS OR STUDENTS.
